Afterschool programs play a critical role in helping students succeed, keeping young people safe, and supporting working families. The ND Quality Standards for Out-of-School Time Programs are designed to acknowledge the work afterschool programs do and help take programs to the next level.

North Dakota 21st Century Community (21CCLC) Learning Centers adopted the ND Quality Standards for Out-of-School Time Programs for the 2023 - 2024 school year for each 21CCLC program to engage in a thoughtful review of program quality with stakeholders.

The ND Quality Standards for Out-of-School Time Program Self-Assessment is comprised of 4 Domains with 13-20 indicators each. Programs rate themselves on a scale from 1 (Experiencing Challenges) to 4 (Excelling) and answer Health and Safety indicators with "yes" or "no".

### 2023-2024 SELF-ASSESSMENT DATA

May 2024

21CCLC Program Sites submitted quality self-assessment data in the Fall of 2023. Grantees receiving targeted supports participated in an on-site facilitated self-assessment process with a quality coach. Each site selected two quality indicators to focus on for the program year and submitted progress on the goals in the Spring of 2024.

The most frequently selected indicators of focus within each domain and reported progress are found below.



<u>HS10:</u> Our staff are trained in CPR and first aid. There's always at least one CPR and first aid certified staff member working with youth.

Grantees reported an increase in the number of staff CPR certified



<u>RI10 & 12:</u> We have ongoing & meaningful relationships with families in our program. We provide opportunities for families to communicate and provide feedback.

Grantees reported adding family to advisory councils, parent surveys, and an increase in family nights.



<u>PD1:</u> Youth are included in program design. We encourage and provide meaningful opportunities for youth voice, choice, and leadership.

Grantees reported youth interest surveys, adding youth leadership roles, increased activities for future career exploration, increased community partners for field trips & presentations.



<u>LM12:</u> We make professional development a priority. Our staff participate in relevant professional development opportunities & we have a budget to fund ongoing learning.

Grantees reported seeking out professional learning opportunities for staff and including afterschool staff in school-day professional development.

### 2023-2024 SELF-ASSESSMENT DATA

May 2024

Most requested support: Social emotional learning activities and curriculum, funding, CPR/First Aid, sample surveys for staff, youth, and families, virtual professional development, supporting youth on IEPs

<u>Challenges most frequently reported:</u> Consistent staffing, funding, finding time for staff to take trainings, ongoing change in student population making it challenging to learn and meet students' needs, consistent and efficient communication tools and channels

In response, the ND Afterschool Network will utilize a professional development platform developed for out-of-school time programs with on-demand courses and develop state-specific trainings. The Network's Quality Workgroup is in the process of developing suggested learning pathways according to staff position and length of service. All 21CCLC programs will have access to this platform through the 2024 summer and 2024-2025 school year at no cost.

The Network is working to increase capacity to continue supporting the quality of 21st Century Community Learning Center programs sites across the state and to provide more on-site coaching visits.

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
